Summary:

The North Korean government didn't reply officially, but they recalled their diplomats in terms of a reaction. Visa could be issued only for maintenance related people. Police will keep monitoring the suspicious diplomats.

Notits

Den nordkoreanske ambassade.

1) For så vidt angår spørgsmålet om hvorvidt der foreligger svar på den danske note til Nordkoreas regering kan udtales, at der ikke foreligger noget officielt svar fra den nordkoreanske regering. På den anden side har den nordkoreanske regering hjemkaldt sine 4 diplomater. I denne handling ligger jo en anerkendelse af den danske regerings note.

2) For så vidt angår udstedelse af visum kan udtales, at der er udstedt visum til 3 koreanske diplomater, som formentlig i en overgangstid skal varetage ambassadens funktioner.

Det siger sig selv, at politiet vil have opmærksomheden henledt på de diplomater, som vil blive anmeldt, herunder om de har været impliceret i ulovlige aktiviteter i andre lande.

North Korean Embassy.

- 1) Regarding the question of whether a reply to the Danish note to the North Korean Embassy is present, it can be stated that an official reply from the North Korean government has not been received. However, the North Korean government has recalled 4 of their diplomats, and this may be viewed as an implicit recognition of the notice from the Danish government.
- 2) With regards to the issuance of visas, it can be stated that visas have been issued to 3 Korean diplomats who will, presumably, maintain the daily operation of the Embassy for an interim period.

As might be expected, the police will seek to monitor the diplomats who are suspects in the affair, and attempt to uncover their involvement in illegal activities in other countries.
