Dear DeMille:

Recent conversations and communications between you and Fred Dulbois on one side and David Ogier, Nathan Martus and myself on the other have led us to make the following comments in the interest of continued harmonious and effective cooperation among us all:

- 1) The National Committee for Free Europe, though partially private, is an integral part of a governmental project and as such is almost exclusively political. The work of NCFE constitutes one of the activities connected with CSC, which is considered a vital and confidential government agency. CSC was created to serve as an instrument for the realization of basic, official policies of the highest order and is directly responsible to the highest ranking government officials.
- 2) In view of the pronounced official character of the enterprise in which NCFE is engaged and due to the fact that a large part of the funds at the Committee's disposal are from the government, NCFE must be closely guided by government organs, especially by the State Department through CSC.
- 3) As you yourself have often taken pains to point out this does not mean that the distinguished directors and sponsors of the NCFE are "sheeves". It means that all their decisions and acts must be kept within the framework of government policies and plans. Naturally, there is no desire to discourage the activity or initiatives of your directors and sponsors. We all feel deeply grateful to you for playing such a part in attaching each man to the Committee. Their interest, participation and active backing will add much-needed momentum and prestige to our undertaking.
- 4) For that reason we are pleased that you are planning to launch a drive for funds as soon as feasible after Labor Day.
- 5) In view of the main source of our funds, of the fact that though sufficient they are not unlimited, and of the definite political aims which the government expects to achieve in expending them, it seems to us advisable for New York and Washington to cooperate in working out final drafts of the major budget items. Among major items we consider the National Committee budget, for example, we are prepared to make this suggestion, not because of any disapproval of any budget deviation

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made by DMR but because the prospective activities of certain countries, or activities carried by certain countries, may on occasions be of a confidential nature the notifications of which can be initially known only to Washington.

Also certain persons attached to the committees, or activities concerned by the Committee may have had the secret of the U.S. Government. The Committees are closely connected with thousands of refugees in Europe, in which the U.S. Government is interested. Some of these refugees are useful, others are Communists agents, still others are fascists. Consequently, some projects require a certain extent of screening by representatives of their government agencies.

Nothing mysterious or of a "keep out visitors" nature is intended in this explanation; we are only saying that in the great majority of vital U.S. government activities, with which DMR is closely concerned, we believe continued close consultation with our major budget items will be helpful to the project.

- 6) As a corollary to this, it would help us in planning if you
 - a) would tell us each month what your expenditures have been and
 - b) if you'd continue to notify us of each new Committee commitment involving the continuous expenditure of any appreciable sum.
- 7) In view of the necessity of close cooperation we shall endeavor not only to get substitution answers from the proper government sources to any policy questions you may raise but shall send you periodical reports on policy developments. With this we do not wish to give you the impression, that any day we can immediately get policy information directly from top sources. We go through well defined channels which reach to the necessary sources. Usually the channels are well and ordinarily policy information is given promptly after policy decisions have been made.
- 8) It is self-understood that we want to cooperate most closely with you in our contacts with the exile leaders. Before discussing any matters involving U.N.R.R. with members of the National Committee whether in Washington or New York or elsewhere else we shall endeavor to see one of you, so as to assure a common point of view. We hope you will feel assured that none of us is acting on his own in relations with members of National Committee or in any matter concerning U.N.R.R. and if you should get that impression, please tell us of it.

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9) We are engaged in a difficult, arduous task, partly private but predominantly governmental, very popular, national, states, government and their government agencies are improving our chances to do something useful for our country. An unique opportunity for understanding and cause for feelings of frustration always. For them reasons, we consider a continuation of our close cooperation and consultation to essential.
