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SOUTH AFRICAN NUCLEAR INTENTIONS: THE KALAHARI FACILITY

1. Thank you for your minute of yesterday's date.
2. I would be inclined to discount altogether the view which Mr Nye ascribed to "a few people in Washington" that the Kalahari facility was a dummy test site built by the South Africans in the belief that its discovery would frighten Western countries and deter them from putting too much pressure on South Africa over racial or other issues. I doubt very much if the South Africans would think like that.

3. I would see a simpler explanation. I think it is only too likely that the South Africans are taking steps to equip themselves with a nuclear weapon capability and that their reason for doing so is that they feel increasingly threatened and foresee a possible need to use nuclear weapons in their own defence if it should come to that. My guess, based not so much on direct evidence but rather on the way that the South Africans would be likely to be thinking, is that they have decided to do everything to prepare the way short of actually testing a nuclear weapon. In other words, what they may be doing is to shorten to the minimum the time which it would take to have an effective nuclear weapon once they had decided that they need no longer conceal their intention.
