Dear Mr. President,

I am writing to you in connection with the planned creation of an atomic submarine in India with Soviet cooperation. You probably remember that we clearly touched on this question in a conversation in Moscow on July 15th.

Work on this project has slowed because of our inability to come to an understanding on the basic engine installation of the submarine. While we would prefer to prolong the development of our own type of this installation, Soviet experts expressed concern about the safety of the system. At the time of his recent visit in India Academician Igor Dmitrevich Spasskii assured me that he will be satisfied with the course of work in all other areas of planning and construction, and he is convinced that the reactor plan should be changed because of safety considerations.

I am certain that we can consider and work out the details of a resolution of this problem through planned consultations and cooperation. If necessary, we can also develop an order of delivery of component systems from the Soviet Union with necessary consideration of mutual interests and considerations.

I am requesting your personal intervention because the impasse over this aspect of the program has already held up the implementation of the project for over a year. I am also requesting the Scientific Advisor on Questions of Defense Arunachalama to visit the Soviet Union to work out the details with his partners, after the political indication allows a resolution of the problem created.
